What St. Mary's Children Really Need

In December, Santa and Mrs. Claus visited with the children served by St. Mary's. A little boy sat down next to Santa and when asked what he wanted for Christmas, he didn't request presents for himself. No Legos or remote control cars. Instead, he said he wanted a "happy family" and for "everyone to get along."

In another classroom at our George N. Hunt Campus School, Santa and Mrs. Claus entered to say goodbye to some of our youngest children. The students crowded around Santa and one of them shouted "group hug!" The youngsters threw their arms around Santa's belly and they grasped onto to each other for several minutes.

These scenes from the holiday season show what the children who come to St. Mary's need – they need to feel heard and loved. They need a stable home. And they need hope for a better future no matter what trauma they have already suffered.

The children served by St. Mary's face all sorts of obstacles that can derail their potential. Whether it's a family that is stressed due to trauma or a child with a psychiatric disorder or a child struggling to learn, St. Mary's is there for them. Helping a family that is strained by a trauma such as sexual abuse takes a full team of experts in mental health because we don't just assist the child in need, but their entire family because everyone is affected when something bad happens to a child. About 76% of our clients are children. In addition, our Outpatient Department helps adults to deal with traumas they have suffered.

The children we serve have all the potential in the world. But when they struggle with big problems, their lives can go off track, veering towards issues such as drug abuse, homelessness, or uncontrolled anger – issues that can literally ruin their futures. But St. Mary's knows that with the right services and a lot of love, these children can overcome their circumstance and grow into healthy, productive adults.

Kitchen Group Offers Healthy Meals

It can't be easy cooking for dozens of picky eaters every day but Amanda Allard does it with style. Allard is the Chef Manager of St. Mary's new food service, the CulinArt Group, which serves customers in the corporate, higher education, private school, and senior dining areas, and has operations in 50 countries.

At St. Mary's, Allard oversees

staff cooking more than 140 meals every day of the week to feed hungry Residential Services children and teens as well as day students at the George N. Hunt Campus School, while also providing meals and Grab and Go items to staff. But Allard doesn't just hide in the kitchen. "I love that the kids are pretty receptive to trying new things. I put out something about once a week for them to try. They get excited about the new fruits and vegetables," Allard said. "Then I talk to the kids to find out what they want."

Of course, while plenty of kids say they want fast food, Allard's job is to help them eat healthier. She said that meals are cooked from scratch and the kitchen takes steps to avoid food waste. In the future, Allard hopes to have a garden on St. Mary's campus where compostable food leftovers can be used as fertilizer.

Prior to working at St. Mary's, Allard cooked for 1,200 students and staff at Bishop Hendricken High School. School Administrator Focuses On Empowering Students

Every morning at the George N. Hunt Campus School, new School Administrator Diane Long stands at the front door greeting each child as they arrive. It's part of her leadership style – listening first and then helping students and teachers with what they need.

"We are the ones honored to be educating them," Long said of the school students who consist of St. Mary's Residential Services clients and day students from cities and towns around Rhode Island. "First and foremost, you have to spend

time on what is working now and where students and teachers need that support."

Long began her new position in Fall 2021 when the previous Administrator, Marty Morris, retired. She has a background as an English teacher and school administrator. Most recently, Long worked with youth in statewide institutional settings in Massachusetts as Director of Professional Development and Curriculum. She has also taught graduate courses in special education and supervised teacher candidates in their practicum semesters at Fitchburg State University.

Long brings this breadth of experience to the Special Education school located on St. Mary's campus where she is helping to expand the offerings to include areas such as music, kickboxing, and a theater class offered by Trinity Rep. She is also working closely with teachers to ensure they have enough planning time as well as access to professional development and additional curriculums. She is focused on ensuring the school uses technology effectively and motivates its students in positive ways.

We are the place where you have that person, that teacher, that social worker, who gives students that glimmer of academic life again. Many have had trauma around school. We are reengaging youth with academics so they will have the power of education that no one can ever take away from them."
