Giving educators the tools they need to keep students' trauma from interfering with learning





Trauma is affecting learning in the classroom

The number of children who have experienced trauma continues to increase. The impact of these traumatic experiences interfere with a child's ability to learn and an educator's ability to meet students' needs. In order for educators to be accessible and caring, they need a bag of tricks to meet the students' needs while understanding the importance of self-care and of meeting their own needs. It's a difficult but necessary balance one we want to help educators to master through our Trauma-Informed Schools Training and Consultation.

Three tiers of support

Support and education about trauma

What is trauma? How to identify it in the classroom? How to respond? How does trauma impact various family cultures and needs? Specific topics such as ADHD vs. trauma, interrupted child development, and the impact of trauma on the brain will be explored. Plus, the importance of engaging in self-care will ensure the educator's needs are being met, so they can positively address the students' needs.

Concrete strategies for the classroom

Topics include how to structure classroom time to allow for brain breaks, quiet and calm sensory interventions, and safe feelings expression. This predictable routine allows the child's brain to be focused and attentive in order to increase their learning readiness and decrease less desirable classroom behaviors.

Specific suggestions for individual classrooms

Being able to observe and make personalized suggestions for interventions in the classroom provides helpful tools for educators who may be challenged with individual students' presentations and needs. This allows for one-on-one coaching opportunities in which a Clinical Team Member can mentor the educator on their self-identified needs related to their classroom dynamics.
